In an increasingly digitized world, interpersonal skills and character development through education is a fundamental and critical element of a well-rounded education.




Corsicana ISD addresses growing poverty in its community by expanding its career training, literacy, and language programs to residents of all ages and cultural backgrounds.




## **Guiding Principle No. 12**

#### **Five Scenarios**



#### **Scenario One**

- 1. Make necessary renovations to Drane and leave Drane in operation as a 6<sup>th</sup> grade center.
- 2. Construct new elementary to accommodate growth.
- 3. Renovations/repairs to all other facilities as identified in the TASB facilities assessment.
- Requires change to attendance boundaries.
- Leaves single grade at Drane and does not address middle school growth.
- Young students get used to modern facility then meet disappointment at secondary campuses.



#### **Scenario Two**

- 1. Build new intermediate school to serve 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grades.
- 2. Sell, demolish, or repurpose Drane.
- 3. Renovations/repairs to all other facilities as identified in the TASB facilities assessment.
- Does not require change to attendance boundaries.
- Younger students at 5<sup>th</sup>-6<sup>th</sup> level get used to modern facility then meet disappointment at secondary campuses that would be less modernized.



#### **Scenario Three**

- 1. Build new middle school to serve 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade students.
- 2. Convert Collins Middle School into a 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grade intermediate campus.
- 3. Renovations/repairs to all other facilities as identified in the TASB facilities assessment.
- 4. Sell, demolish, or repurpose Drane.
- · Avoids any changes to attendance boundaries.
- · Signature new campus for students/community... good for economic development
- Provides more opportunities for 5<sup>th</sup>/6<sup>th</sup> graders (band, tennis, etc)

#### **Scenario Four**

- 1. Make necessary renovations to Drane Intermediate and leave in operation as 6<sup>th</sup> grade campus.
- 2. Construct additions to Navarro, Carroll, and Bowie campuses to accommodate growth.
- 3. Renovations/repairs to all other facilities as identified in the TASB facilities assessment.
- Can't add on to Fannin, meaning attendance boundary changes.
- Leaves single grade at Drane and does not address middle school growth.
- Does not bring anything new to District.



#### **Scenario Five**

- 1. Construct additions to Collins to convert to 5<sup>th</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> grade campus
- 2. Sell, demolish, or repurpose Drane
- Make necessary renovations / repairs at all other campuses as identified in the facility assessment
- Major traffic congestion issues at Collins campus.
- Not enough room on Collins campus to accommodate four grade levels and room for growth.



#### Why Scenario 3?

- 1. Presents the best use of dollars for maximum benefit across the district.
- 2. Allows for space on the elementary campuses, reduces use of portable buildings.
- 3. Provides the Collins campus more years of capacity by housing the 5-6 grades (two gyms, large band hall, tennis courts, practice fields, etc.)
- 4. A new 7-8 campus provides motivation for students at an age where they begin dropping out.
- 5. Funds other campus renovation and/or repairs based on the priorities of the committee.



# **Resolution of Agreement**

The Members of the Facilities Study and Planning Committee have reviewed, studied, and discussed the capital improvement needs of the Corsicana Independent School District and, having considered various scenarios and solutions in light of existing facility conditions, enrollment projections, and estimated tax implications, have come to agreement on a recommendation for consideration by the Corsicana ISD Board of Trustees.

The undersigned members of the Corsicana ISD Facilities Study and Planning Committee fully support and endorse this committee's recommendation to the Board of Trustees that the district request voter approval to invest up to \$50 million in bond funds and \$7 million from fund balance for a new middle school, conversion of Collins Middle School to an Intermediate 5-6 campus, and improvements to all other campuses addressing safety and security, technology, educational adequacy, and building systems as noted in the detailed bond plan worksheet.
